The Center's mission focuses on preserving and fostering affordable homeownership throughout New York through advocacy and support and leveraging its subsidiary to serve homeowners through charitable loan programs, including foreclosure avoidance, climate resiliency, home repair, first-time homebuyer, and heirs' property preservation.

Scott previously directed the Homeowner Stability and LGBT Advocacy Projects at the New York City Bar Justice Center. In that role, Scott trained attorneys, supervised cases placed with pro bono and staff attorneys, provided direct legal representation to distressed homeowners, and engaged in law reform to preserve housing and communities. Scott's areas of expertise include (i) foreclosure, lending and property law, (ii) heirs property and community stabilization, (iii) deed theft and scam prevention, and (iv) non-profit law, all with an acute focus on racial equity and social justice across communities. He is a 1996 graduate of the University of Minnesota with a B.A. in Portuguese and Spanish and a 2001 graduate of NYU School of Law. Scott worked at Morrison and Foerster prior to transitioning to public interest law. He serves on the New York City Bar Association's Mortgage Foreclosure Task Force and Non-Profit Organizations Committee, the New York Attorney General's Deed Theft Task Force and the New York City Non-Profit Legal Services Foreclosure Prevention Task Force.
