Until October 2022, Ray served over 11 years at the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, where he was the founding director of a research center focused on wealth inequality. He has advised presidential candidates and every Administration since George W. Bush's and has testified before the U.S. House and Senate several times.

Raised in Akron, Ohio, Ray is a first-gen graduate of The Ohio State University. He also holds master's degrees from Yale Divinity School and the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard.
